WOMEN, UNDERPAID ON WAR JOB

Junior girls (aged 18 to 21) employed at a Brisbane drome are discontented. They receive £1/8/... a week less than they were led to believe they would receive.

A lot has been said and written about the big earnings of some workers. Here is the story of some poorly paid workers, The girls underwent a period of training, side by side with adults, at a college under the supervision of a Government department. During training and be-fore being engaged they were told that they would receive £3/8/- for a Week of 44 hours, plus overtime.

Travelling expenses, in some cases more than 8/- a week, and board, leave little for clothes and essential food items like milk and fruit, to say nothing of recreation.

Overtime returns a few extra shillings. But, our young women should not have to work overtime to earn something approaching a living wage, which is sup-posed to be based on an ordinary work-

ing week.
These young women require food, clothing and healthy recreation of adults. They should not be treated as children. The way to give these young women what they are entitled to is to grant senior status to women over 18 years of

Land Armies Must Join Air Forces To Smash Axis Powers In Europe

Is Europe on the brink of new smashing offensives that soon will seal the doom of the Axis in Europe? The devastating bomb ing of Italy and Germany by the Allied air forces, and the gigantic air battles raging on the Russian front are preparing the ground for concerted land drives.

Churchill's conversations with service chiefs in North Africa have meaning only in the light of the long-awaited second front.

But despite these encouraging signs, anti-second front arguments continue. Latest is that the war can be won by

bombing alone: If would be tragic if Allied Councils were divided on the question of land tront versus air front. The urgency of the tasks do not allow of controversy or

experiment on this point.

England, a more concentrated target than Germany, Italy and occupied Europe did not crack under Goering's blitz. The R.A.F. will not succeed alone where the Luftwaffe failed.

The Red Army has put out of action permanently 9,000,000 Axis troops an infinitely more serious blow to German morale than bombing.
Stalin has stated that two or three

more blows from the West, like Tunisian victory, together with anoth offensive on the East, are needed make a catastrophe for the Axis an complished fact.

Stalin the greatest strategist in world, geolares that Germany must defeated on the land:

Bombling alone will not bring victor
To rely on bombling alone is to defi what the Axis fears most—the land it vasion.

To be over-optimistic, to underestimate the power of Hitler's friends, the Allied countries, to fail to expose a fight opposition, in whatever form, to co-ordinated land, air and naval strate by Britain, Russia and America, is prolong the war.

The signs are encouraging, but ill victory, the second frost must be found for and won.

While agreeing with the direction of the Commissioner that there must be no more back-door bookings, "Guardian" considers that in the interests of a higher morale and the democratic war effort, the instructions should be carried out and that the start should be made right on the Commissioner's front doorstep.
