The tecernt ruah far divorces io simply a proof of the angeat need thet oxisted for rational lawe to pat thom asunder who have been united under a mistaken isaprestion. In Europe, the mat. who joins the ranks abandons his personality and hecomes the slave of a lard and fast bystem of discipline, and a mere autumeton, coming and gring at the biddiu, of his superiors, who are invariably men of the so called higher clasess, whose eminence in due to infloence, pririlege, and hard casti, and whose bufty contempt for the masses becomes simple trranay when their social adrantagea are backed up by military powers. There it is the first principle of militarism that the atter sabjection of the indiridual is the only means of controlling s regiment. That will not be foand to wash here. In Victoria, joining the militia is a matter of ohoice; the young man joins because he thinke it is rather pleasant-disillusion him and lose him. The high and wighty warriot who tries to perpetnate ibnee hoory, Imperial traditions and pose before our men as a martinet is half egotist, hall humbug, and will get neither respoct vor obedjence fromu his regiment. The disposition to resent anj extraragant assumption of superiority is strong is the Augtralian mind, and in bound to make itself felt when any ambitions and dixingenions officer tries to emrlate the fasefrily and womderfulty stern and proad oommander of the cheasp story book.
