SOCIALISM IN SYDNEY.

The Australian Socialist League held its annual meeting last Sunday, the subject of discussion being "Russian Nihilists and their Land Leaguers." Comrade Drake occupied the chair. Mr. McNamara dealt very ably with his subject, explaining the rise of Nihilism and its present position in Russia. He detailed how men and women belonging to the aristocratic classes left their lives of ease and luxury to go among the people and preach the gospel of social salvation; how Prince Kropotkin came to the late Czar, putting aside his rank and pleasure, donned the costume of the artisan, to preach Socialism to a suffering people; his subsequent arrest and escape from the fortress of St. Paul, and his imprisonment in France by the black Jobbery hagman's republic at the instigation of Russia. The speaker referred to the ever increasing volume of political offenders and suspects which were sent to Siberia and remote parts of the empire; journeys of thousands of miles, mostly on foot, and occupying from two years to two years and a half in a confinement; the over-crowding of the prisons of Russia, and the intense suffering of the poor women and children accompanying their husbands and fathers to their place of banishment; and all because these poor people claimed the right to life, and happiness, and freedom.

Referring to Ireland he pointed out that the principle was working destruction and misery there: the use of force and brutality to rents which the people of Ireland had no means of paying, and which said rents were the personal property of those who earned them, and the English and Irish landlords who employed "all the resources of civilisation" to expel from a defenceless people.

Comrade Drake said we need not go so far as Ireland—need not go from Sydney even—to find conditions practised, fitted to tank with the dark Infantries of Russian bureaucracy. The Wellington Asylum furnished examples of

"unhumanity to man," not to be spoken about warmth, and urged upon the audience the duty of dragging this matter to the light of day, and to post until such sufferings were removed from our midst.

Meeting shortly after adjourned, it being voted to discuss the Manifesto of the League meeting next Sunday, which will be held at 533 George-street. SOCIALIST,
