LATEST ENGLISH NEWS.

The Blue Jacket, conveying the March mails from England, arrived on Sunday, the 13th May, in Hobson's Bay.

She sailed on the morning of the 6th March, and has made the passage in sixty-eight days. The Emperor of Russia died on the 2nd March,

after a very brief illness. Three of the Ministry - Mr. Gladstone, Sir James Graham, and Mr. Sidney Herbert had resigned, in consequence of an adverse division of housemen; Kesteven Brothers, London, warehousethe House of Commons, in reference to the committee of inquiry into the conduct of the war. Lord John Russell had accepted office as Secre-

tary for the colonies. The news of the Ballarat riots had reached

England, by way of India, with dates to the 6th December.

The question of the Australian Constitution had been mooted in the House, but the matter was postponed till the return of Lord John Russell from Vienna. Reference was made to the advice of a gentleman in England, "recently holding a high appointment in Victoria," evidently Mr. La Trobe.

The Emperor of the French has decided upon

going to the Crimea in person. A sanguinary battle had been fought at Eupatoria, resulting unfavorably to the Russians.

The generals appear to have decided to invest Sebastopol, instead of risking the taking it by Joseph Hume died in the beginning of March,

The political news of England and Europe for the last month is very exciting. All nations are preparing for war. The Emperor Nicholas has issued a proclamation calling all Russia to arms. A Conference sits at Vienna to try its hand at peace, but everybody believes it will fail. Riotshave broken out in Liverpool and London. An enormous Baltic fleet is getting ready under Admiral Sir R. Dundas. Sebastopol still holds out, and the Emperor Napoleon goes to the Crimes to take the command of the perishing army. The English have retired from the trenches to Balaklava, and only 10,000 remain out of an army of 54,000. Another terrible battle is expected at Balaklava. Great is the confusion in Parliament for want of men to form a right Ministry. The Queen has failed in several attempts to get a Ministry. She at last succeeded with Lord Palmerston, but the new Cabinet was only a few days old when the Peel party retired from it, and it is now made up of Lords and Whigs, Mr. Roebuck has carried his motion for inquiring into military mismanagement, and the committee sits, like an inquisition, with closed doors. The English people are so disappointed and excited as to talk about Revolution rather than Reform. A terrible crisis has certainly come, and the news of Australian revolt heightens Another quarrel has sprung up with our

Sardinia is the only State which has yet formally decided for the Allies. The Two Sicilies and America have signed deeds of neutrality. Prussia still inclines to the Czar. Austria is expected to join the Allies in the field of battle with an army under the command of its Emperor.

COMMERCIAL. Since our last, there has been very little later news from the Australian Colonies, and the aspects are still gloomy; and when the later advices arrive, they cannot be very flattering, considering the amount of cargo yet to arrive. We are glad to say, in the month just ended, as well as January, there has been only exported something like a reasonable amount. If this caution is only used for six months, it will get the colonies into a more healthy state, and the goods shipped the last month are generally of every day's consumption. The Kent arrived at Gravesend on February 28th, and the Marco Polo at Liverpool the same day; they were in company together in Bass Straits, and they never saw each other afterwards during the voyage. They left Hobson's Bay the same tide. The Brilliant, which left Geelong at the same time, has not yet arrived. The gold brought by the Kent and Marco Polo is valued at £500,000. During the last six months there have been shipped to the Australian ports nearly 30,000 firkins of butter; the next accounts, we are afraid, will bring news that this article, like the rest, will be losing money to the shippers.

DEATH OF THE EMPEROR OF

RUSSIA. Yesterday the Foreign-office received telegraphic intelligence that the Emperor of Russia was

"The Emperor Nicholas died this morning at one o'clock of pulmonic apoplexy after an attack of influenza.

THE LATE EMPEROR. We are to-day suddenly called to record the death of a monarch who for nearly thirty years has ruled with absolute sway over the most extensive empire in the world. Nicholas L, born 6th July 1796, did not for a long time seem likely to inherit so much power. He was the third son of the Emperor Paul by his second wife, Mary, of Wurtemberg, his elder brothers, Alexander and Constantine, standing between him and the throne. The young prince was educated, under the direction of his mother and the Baroness Lieven, by General Lansdorf, with the assistance of tutors for special departments of instruction ; thus Adelung gave him instruction in languages, and Stork lessons in political economy. Great pains were taken to induct him into those sciences which contribute to perfect the military art, and his big

the theory and practice of fertification. The boy was not five years of age when the night Palace murder of March 23, 1801, made him an orphan. His brother Alexander was enthroned, and took the oath at the hands of his father's assassins. For years after these events Nicholas lived almost forgotten. In 1815 he travelled in Europe visiting

France and England.

On the 1st December, 1825, Alexander breathed his last at Taganrog. It is said that just before dying he designated his youngest brother his successor to the throne. Constantine, next in the order of natural succession, was yet living : but, whether voluntarily or by enforcement, he had signed an engagement to Alexander, by which he renounced his eventual claims to the throne, and the document attesting this act was in the hands of Nicholas when he received the news of the Emperor's death. Nicholas whether sincerely or dramatically, refused to accept the homage offered him by those who were aware of the actual state of things, and loudly professed his allegiance to Constantine the new Emperor. Meanwhile Constantine, who was at Warsaw, was taking the onth to Nicholas. Russia was at this time the theatre of a great conspiracy. The army and the aristocracy were pervaded by secret societies, aiming at the establishment of a freer government, and the chiefs of these determined to profit by the uncertainty of the hour, and to strike a blow. Their tacties were to spread the report to the garrisons of the Empire that the abdication of Constantine was a forgery, and to appeal to the soldiers, in the name of loyalty, to rise and put down what they represented to be a coup d'etat against legitimacy. On the 26th of December the eath to Nicholas was to be taken by the garrison of St. Petersburg. Several regiments swore allegiance, but the Moscow regiments, the Marines of the Guard, and the Grenadiers refused the oath, and marched to the streets and squares, shouting for Constantine. Nicholas saw all from his palace windows. The insurrection was suppressed with grape shot. Five scaffolds were erected on the esplanade of the Fortress of St. Petersburg, thirtysix noble persons were executed, and eighty-five sent to Siberia: From that time Russia Proper has been exempt from outbreaks if not from conspiracies, and the late Czar was left free to carry out his idea of Government

The Hereditary Grand Duke Alexander would, in the ordinary course of things, succeed to the Russian throne. He was born in 1818, and is married to the Princess Mary of Hesse .- Empire.

Members of Council retire annually in rotation. If the Council consist of three, one retires; if of five, two retire; if of seven, three retire. Retiring members are eligible for re-election. At annual elections rate-payers only will be

qualified to vote. Every male person of full age liable to be meetings.

Under the new police act it is provided that in any city or town in which a corporation or municipal body shall exist, onehalf of the moneys arising from fines, penalties, and forfeitures shall be paid to the treasurer of such corporation for the public uses. Whatever is to be got from this fund may as well be spent on local improvements, as to be totally lost to Kilmore. Those improvements would, at a very trifling expense to the rate-payers, mise the value of property, and increase the comforts of the People.

From the Seat of War.

VIESSA, Sunday morning, Feb. 25th. According to official despatches received here, 40,000 Russians made an attack upon Eupatoria fighting the Russians were repulsed with considerable loss-reported at 500 men. The loss of the Turks, who were commanded by Omar Pasha, all did not fare as luxuriously as himself. was inconsiderable.

A telegraphic despatch from Bucharest, dated the 23rd of February, announces that on Saturday, the 17th instant, at six o'clock in the morning, the Russians, to the number of 40,000, under the orders of General Liprandi, attacked Eupatoria. After a combat of four hours they were vigorously repulsed with considerable loss, by the Turks under the command of Omar Pasha. The Turks had 15 killed, and 35 wounded. The Egyptian Suleyman Pasha was killed. A battery served by the French lost four men.

PERA, February 15th. The wind is still in the south, and our transports get rapidly through the Straits. A great number of vessels arrived this week at Kamiesch, with provisions of every description,

MARSEILLES, February 24th. The Thabor, which left Constantinople on the 10th inst., has arrived. Despatches for the Government left here at 4 p.m. Advices from the Crimea, dated the 14th inst., brought to Malta by the Arabia, in 63 hours from Constantinople, announce that some thousand Russians who accompanied the Grand Duke Michael to Sebastopol had been frozen to death. The affair of the mine, mentioned in a Russian despatch, is explained by advices from Constantinople of the 15th. A Russian counter mine was driven into a French mine on the night of the 4th. Only two French were killed.

BERLIN, Sunday. Advices from St. Petersburg of the 17th state that Count Nesselrode has issued a circular despatch, expressing the Emperor's disapprobation of the conduct of Sardinia. War is declared against Sardinia. Notice has been given to Sardinian vessels to leave the Russian ports. The exequatur has been withdrawn from the Sardinian Consuls. The Russian agents at Genoa and Nice have been recalled. The property of Sardinian subjects has been placed under the protection of the laws
